#### **Caring For Our Neighbors**

Diversifying Doulas works to address racial inequities in childbirth in Lancaster County

The UPMC Pinnacle Foundation is committed to serving the central PA community, and throughout 2021, we were proud to partner with several organizations to meet the unique needs of our community.

In July 2021, the UPMC Pinnacle Foundation committed to giving \$50,000 annually over the course of five years - a total gift of \$250,000 - to Diversifying Doulas, an initiative developed by Patients R Waiting in Lancaster. Because Black and Latinx women are four times as likely to die in childbirth as their white counterparts, Diversifying Doulas is addressing this inequity by hiring over 60 women of color to work as certified doulas, providing services to pregnant women of color.

This gift by the UPMC Pinnacle Foundation will allow for more sustainable funding so the program can hire more doulas of color while growing the program to Harrisburg, Carlisle, and York.

The UPMC Pinnacle Foundation is proud to partner with the Peyton Walker Foundation, one of the country's most prominent heart screening advocates and leaders in providing CPR and AED training and equipment donations, as well as a strong advocate for education about the prevalence of sudden cardiac arrest.

Together through our partnership, we have placed over 250 AEDs with various nonprofit organizations, schools, and police departments, increasing the likelihood that an AED will be quickly accessible in the event of a cardiac arrest. We look forward to continuing that work in 2022 and highlighting the importance of education and heart screenings.

**UPMC Pinnacle Foundation partners** with Central PA Food Bank to address food insecurity in our community

The UPMC Pinnacle Foundation also remains committed to our partnership with the Central PA Food Bank. In 2021, we provided \$100,000 in funding to address food insecurities in the community, a need that has been exacerbated by the COVID-19 pandemic. We also provided \$25,000 to the Food Bank for emergency food boxes. These boxes are provided to patients who screen positive for food insecurity as part of a broader medical check-up, allowing us to address food needs as a health issue within the clinical setting.

As part of this process, the Food Bank also refers patients to the SNAP program and/or community food pantries to provide a long-term solution for patients in need.

Health and wellness don't stop at the hospital, and the UPMC Pinnacle and foster wellness for our neighbors. "UPMC Pinnacle Foundation's \$100,000 gift will provide more than 600,000 meals to those in Dauphin, Lancaster, Cumberland and York Counties, who are still working hard to get back on their feet in the wake of COVID-19."

## A Helping Hand

Whether the family of a pediatric patient needs help paying for medications they can't afford, or an oncology patient needs help getting to and from their infusion appointments, the mission of the Helping Hands Fund is always the same: to help our patients in need in any way that we can.

Thanks to the Helping Hands Fund and the incredible work of our Social Services team, we were able to care for our patients in need in significant ways in 2021.

- We covered the cost of medication, in full, for seven pediatric patients.
- We arranged for transportation to and from the hospital for the partner of a woman who was hospitalized for four weeks prior to delivering her baby.
- We helped an oncology patient in danger of eviction with rental assistance.
- We gave a prostate cancer patient a dignified death through Hospice of Central PA when he had nowhere else to go.

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## **Melissa's Story**



When school nurse Melissa Fitzgerald went to her doctor for a routine mammogram, she never expected that it would lead to her being diagnosed with breast cancer. In that moment, her world changed, and decisions had to be made quickly as to who would help lead the charge of her care. She was immediately advised by her provider to seek the best, Dr. Lisa Torp and the Breast Care team at UPMC in Central Pa.

Dr. Torp supported Melissa through every step of her journey. "You just know she's there for you," Melissa says. "The building could be falling down and she's still solely focused on you." During her pre-surgery appointment, Melissa brought a binder full of notes and questions to go over, but at the end, she found that Dr. Torp had already addressed all of them.



## **Henry's Story**





When Henry Wardrop walked into his gym in Hanover on June 28th, 2020, he thought it was just another day. Instead, he experienced sudden cardiac arrest while exercising and was immediately transported to UPMC Hanover after CPR was performed. He spent four days in the Intensive Care Unit, where he was in a coma and on a ventilator, with his wife, Jane, at his side. "She remembers my time there vividly," Henry says. "She has expressed to me the great care and attention I was given by all staff members in the Emergency Room and on the Intensive Care Unit."

On July 1st, he was transferred to UPMC Harrisburg, where he remained in the Cardiac Intensive Care Unit for four days. He was then transferred to the Cardiac Care Unit in preparation for bypass surgery on July 7th, performed by Dr. A. Reza Abrishamchian.

"Unfortunately, I cannot name all the individuals who provided my care and with whom I interacted, but I can say without reservation or hesitation that I could not have received better care," Henry says. "Everyone, and I do mean everyone who makes up the patient care team, was always kind, respectful, professional, and genuinely had my best interests at heart."

Henry was discharged from the hospital on July 11th. On August 26th, one day before his 65th birthday, he met with Dr. Abrishamchian and his staff for the final time. "I am positive without the volunteers who performed CPR/AED at the gym and the high quality of care by the staff at both UPMC Hanover and UPMC Pinnacle [UPMC in Central Pa.] Harrisburg, I would not have been able to celebrate my 65th birthday," Henry says. "I am grateful and thankful."

## **Henry's Story**

But this story doesn't end there.

At the end of 2021, off-duty nurse Sarah Callender decided to join a new gym. She was working out when a man approached her and introduced himself. The man was Henry, and Sarah was that same off-duty nurse who had saved his life the year before. Their reunion was not only emotional but life-changing for both. After Henry's cardiac arrest, Sarah made the decision to become a stayat-home mom to her children, remarking that life is too short to spend time away from those she loved.

"We talk all the time. He is part of my family at this point," said Sarah. "Here he is that I get to see him and talk to him every day. I was where I was supposed to be that day just as I was supposed to be back at that gym to find him again."

When thinking back to the critical moments during her life-saving efforts with Henry, Sarah was overcome with emotion. "We couldn't feel a pulse," she said, "He got a second chance at life. Everything happens for a reason."





## 2021 Events A Year in Review



Amidst the second year of the pandemic, the UPMC Pinnacle Foundation successfully hosted a series of fundraising events to support programs throughout UPMC in Central Pa. The Foundation has been supporting our hospital communities for more than 80 years, with all dollars staying local to programs and services right here in cnetral Pennsylvania.

The summer tee'd off with three golf tournaments, each altering the typical shotgunstart format to using tee-times to allow for social distancing. Feedback from our
attendees overwhelmingly showed support of continuing this format change. The
30th Annual Mary Jane and Cleve J. Fredricksen Golf Tournament was held June 21,
2020, at the Hershey Country Club. This is the Foundation's largest annual event and
hosted 262 golfers spread out by tee-times over both the East and West Golf Course at
the popular Country Club. The tournament brought in over \$167,000 with proceeds
supporting the expansion of patient and family-centered care at UPMC Children's
Harrisburg, bringing nationally ranked inpatient pediatric care to our community!

Brand new in 2021, the Foundation partnered with the Farley family to create A Charming Event on August 28, an annual ladies-only golf outing to support the newly established Farley Family Fund assisting cancer patients at UPMC Hanover. This year the non-competitive outing welcomed 57 women golfers who enjoyed 9-holes of play ending in a refreshing toast of champagne before lunch. Together we raised close to \$4,000 the day of the event, with many additional donations coming in after the event.

In the fall, we did not let COVID-19 stop us from supporting The Mammogram Voucher Program (MVP). the Foundation headed into Breast Cancer Awareness month with the 12th Annual Tea for Mammograms on September 30th, hosting a wonderful virtual event for the second year in a row. The event raised \$40,045 to support MVP, assisting uninsured and under-insured patients in our community to receive life-changing medical care. If living in a pandemic has taught us anything, it's that life isn't about waiting for the storm to pass; it's about learning to dance in the rain.

MVP is life-changing. Sharon Williams can attest to that. She was a recipient of a free mammogram through the UPMC Pinnacle Foundation. "Pinnacle [UPMC in Central Pa.] has been very good to me - they save women's lives who are uninsured," she said. Sharon was staying at the YWCA and her social worker connected her with the program. A mammogram detected a mass and Sharon is grateful for the care and assistance she received. Sharon warmly recalls "The staff at UPMC is so wonderful and patient," Sharon warmly recalls. "They helped me and will continue to help others and save lives." Without the Mammogram Voucher Program, women like Sharon would be unable to receive critical screenings and treatable diseases would go undetected.
