Spring Membership Meeting

The Spring Membership Meeting was held at Harrisburg Country Club on April 25, 2023. We were honored to have Julie Walker, of the Peyton Walker Foundation, present to our group. Here are some excerpts from Julie's presentation:

Sudden cardiac arrest is the #1 killer of student athletes.

It takes the life of 1 child every hour, every single day.

On a picture-perfect Saturday in November 2013, Julie and her husband were sitting in their kitchen enjoying their morning coffee. Julie remembers the beautiful sky and fall foliage and thought about how lucky they were and that life couldn't get any better. Until they got a call that no parent wants to get. King's College in Wilkes-Barre, Pa called to let them know their 19-year-old daughter, Peyton, was in an ambulance on her way to Wilkes-Barre hospital. She was in sudden cardiac arrest.

On the two-hour drive to Wilkes-Barre, they received a call from the hospital and Julie's husband asked, "Is Peyton breathing." The hospital's response was, "No, but we are working on her." Peyton died on November 2, 2013 at age 19. Many of you have heard of the Peyton Walker Foundation, which was set up in Peyton's memory, but you may not know how it came to be. Julie was spurred to action when months later she opened the bag of Peyton's clothing that the hospital gave to her. The motivation to establish the foundation came from the red shirt that Peyton was wearing on November 2: "What we do for ourselves dies with us. . . What we do for others and the world remains and is immortal." (Albert Pine).



Sudden Cardiac Arrest

Julie went on to explain to the group that sudden cardiac arrest is different from a heart attack. Sudden cardiac arrest is when the heart malfunctions and suddenly stops beating. Heart attack is when the blood flow to the heart is blocked. Sudden cardiac arrest is an "electrical" problem where a heart attack is a "circulation" problem.

The Peyton Walker Foundation focuses on 3 pillars: Checking Hearts, Protecting Hearts, Saving Lives. The Foundation aims to educate parents and students about the prevalence of sudden cardiac arrest and the importance of EKG testing. With its partners, such as UPMC in Central Pa, they set up screenings which include free EKGs and possibly echo cardiograms if needed.

Successes

Peyton's Law: Legislation passed in 2020 to provide information about screenings, EKGs, CPR, etc. Pennsylvania was the second state in the country to pass this type of legislation

Automated External Defibrillators (AEDs): To date, 400 AEDS have been donated. Julie told the story of a woman who wanted AEDs at all of the Dillsburg little league baseball fields. On opening day, an AED saved the life of a father in the stands; at another game, the AED saved the life of a mother of one of the players. A young man, who had found out about his heart issue



at one of the Peyton Walker screenings, wanted to pay it forward and raised money for an AED for the roller-skating rink in Enola, Pa. This AED saved the life of a 10-year-old girl. Julie commented that because of this young man and an AED, her parents will never know the heartache of losing a child. The Auxiliary presented Julie Walker with a donation to cover the cost of one AED.

4-Minute City™ Program: Initiative in Cumberland County, Pa, to have 300 AEDs in the community. A 911 operator will alert the AED that is close to the person suffering the emergency. A volunteer then gets that AED to the person in the critical first minutes while EMTs are on their way.

After the formal presentation, attendees were provided hands-on demonstrations on CPR, how to use an AED and the Heimlich maneuver for choking emergencies.

Veterans Outreach of Pennsylvania (VOPA) Tiny Homes Project

A unique community is coming to a five-acre site overlooking the Susquehanna River in South Harrisburg – 15 tiny homes where veterans experiencing homelessness will live while receiving the treatment and services needed to live empowered lives filled with strength and purpose.

Each 210-square-foot tiny home will be ADA-compliant and furnished with a writing desk, chair, nightstand and platform bed with storage drawers. The furnishings for each home cost \$3,000 and a local company donated the funds to furnish five of the homes. The Auxiliary Board voted at its April meeting to donate \$30,000 to furnish the remaining 10 homes.

The UPMC Pinnacle Foundation has supported the project by contributing \$500,000 dedicated to the community center's construction, and UPMC in Central Pa plans to work collaboratively with VOPA to provide health care services that meet veterans where they are.

As Thomas W. Zimmerman, Jr., chair and co-founder of VOPA wrote in his letter to our treasurer, Cindy Banducci, "Building tiny homes is simply the foundation of our program. Once veterans no longer have to worry about their immediate needs, they can start planning for their future."

Superhero Day

On April 28, UPMC in Central Pa recognized their superheroes – the men and women who take care of patients day in and day out, especially the pediatric patients. Over 900 capes were sold, with proceeds supporting pediatric patients in need throughout all of UPMC in Central Pa. Children were treated to their nurses, doctors and other medical professionals wearing capes, as well as famous superheroes like Superman and Spiderman as they scaled the outside of the hospital and visited children's rooms.

Pinnacle Health Auxiliary donated \$1,000 to this worthwhile day. Teri Jakob presented the Auxiliary Board members with their own superhero capes at the April Board Meeting.





